From the President & CEO

In looking back at 2018 and looking forward to 2019, we see that 2018 was a time of assessment and preparation. The coming year will be one of change.

In 2018 we conducted a survey to get a sense of what impressions people had of the current state of affairs. The results showed gratitude for the role Recovery International has had in their own lives, but concern about its future. Trends of declining meeting attendance, outdated materials, and an aging population of leaders are evident throughout the US and abroad.

The truth of the matter is, we cannot continue the way we have in the past—drastic changes are needed in order for RI to survive long enough to evolve and serve the next generation. Many people have offered good suggestions about marketing, re-vamping materials and creating ways to introduce RI to younger people.

We are working on these ideas and developing new strategies, but it takes time and funding. We are seeking new grants and gifts to make new initiatives possible. But—imagine new books and e-books, or an app with spots and tools! Imagine the Power to Change program for young people available to schools and youth groups across the country. Imagine more webinars and online meetings.

Another key component to success in today's society is partnerships. RI needs to be more visible among other mental health organizations; we need to collaborate on programs and activities in order to reach new audiences. These are some of the possibilities—new ways we can help people achieve better mental health.




